
Academic MLA Paragraphs



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In an academic, research setting *at least* five sentences are needed to defend your chosen subject.

- 1. Topic sentence introduces the subject: *your observations on subject*
- 2. Secondary evidence sentence (SES): *confirmation of your thoughts*
- 3. Analysis or Review of evidence (i): your explanation of information
- 4. Analysis or Review of evidence (ii): your explanation of information
- 5. Conclusion (deductive resolution regarding evidence): *your thesis*

Academic MLA Paragraphs

In Gothic horror fiction, writers often utilize mentally unstable characters as protagonists. ¹<u>One reason for doing so</u> puts readers off-guard and makes them feel uneasy. ²<u>This concept shows, in a sense</u>, a manipulation of the text by displaying narrators' illogical personality types, which disturbs willing readers. ³ <u>As an example</u>, Edgar Allan Poe uses planned strategies which are more than accidental writing. ⁴<u>As a result it can be clearly seen</u> that many of Poe's reworkings of fiction have become standards in modern day short stories. ⁵

- 1. Topic sentence introduces the subject—*general comment*
- 2. Secondary evidence sentence (SES)—*specific point on topic*
- 3. Analysis or Review of evidence—*more specific point on topic*
- 4. Analysis or Review of evidence—*very specific example*
- 5. Conclusion (deductive resolution showing main point)—*specific <u>deductive</u> thesis*
