## **Quick Facts**

**Old English (Anglo-Saxon)** is divided into four dialects:

the Anglian-based: Mercian, Northumbrian

the Saxon-based: Kentish, West Saxon

- "Cædmon's Hymn" is an example of Northumbrian
- Beowulf is an example of West Saxon
- 2. In England sometime within the 6th century, a Latin alphabet was adopted, mainly through influences from the developing monasteries which were constructed throughout the island for both Anglian and Saxon dialects.
- 3. Rather than using Nordic runes, and due to the use of Latin language in academic and royal classes, a shift had developed from the original Viking invaders to the Christian doctrines which were produced in Latin and Greek.
