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Frame Story

Ancient tradition of story telling.

- In simplest terms, the narrator constructs a story within an original story.
- In modern times, it is a literary device allowing the author to tell many stories under a common title

Medieval Examples

- Geoffrey Chaucer, Canterbury Tales
- Giovanni Boccocia, The Decameron (or The Human Comedy)
- Dante Alighieri, *The Divine Comedy*
- Francesco Colonna, Poliphilo's Strife of Love in a Dream (Hypnerotomachia Poliphili)

As a Literary Device

- Such stories encourages the narrator's flaws and unreliability
- Constructs an elaborate metaphor (or conceit) within the full work despite the multiple stories related to the reader
