Learning New Words from Context

Most of the time, a word is not used by itself but with other words. These other words are its *context*. The meaning of a word is often found in its context—the other words with which it is used.

Often on the SAT and ACT tests, passages will use unique wording that you as a reader must decipher meaning through the context of the full passage.

Suppose, for example, we were asked for the meaning of *strike*. We would not be able to give a definite answer because strike, as presented to us, is all by itself; it has no context.

But if we were asked to define *strike* in one of the following sentences we would have not trouble telling its meaning from its *context*—the other words with which it is used.

- 1. Strike three! You're out!
- 2. There was no milk deliveries to HEB this week because of a *strike*.
- 3. He made a fist as if to strike me.

Looking at a full passage can often determine an unknown word's definition.

The new ruler in the country of Tranchecklia is clearly *xenophobic*; he has ordered all foreigners to leave the capital city immediately.
