FINAL PROJECT OBJECTIVES

The final goal of this project is to produce a well-written research paper based on a cause-effect analysis which demonstrates understanding of the following:

- how to analyze an audience and select an appropriate written communication style.
- how to prepare a research paper, utilizing a variety of sources.
- how to synthesize information from a variety of sources into a document.

FINAL DOCUMENT REQUIREMENTS

- Seven (7) full pages, plus an additional work cited page; appendix is optional.
- Entire paper is double spaced, following MLA standard template



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THEME MUST COVER A SOCIAL ISSUE:

- The paper itself will not be a persuasion piece but focus primarily on information. In other words, despite the fact these issues are controversial and despite the fact you will have an opinion on these topics, you are gathering information to show the development of the issue; you are <u>not</u> generating an editorial.
- Your sources of information must be non-biased and objective. However, due to the nature of these issues, your sources may show a preference for one side of the debate.
- The end result of the paper may propose an opinion or a resolution on the topic, however the main goal is not to express your personal feelings or memories, but rather to show you can gather and present research material.
