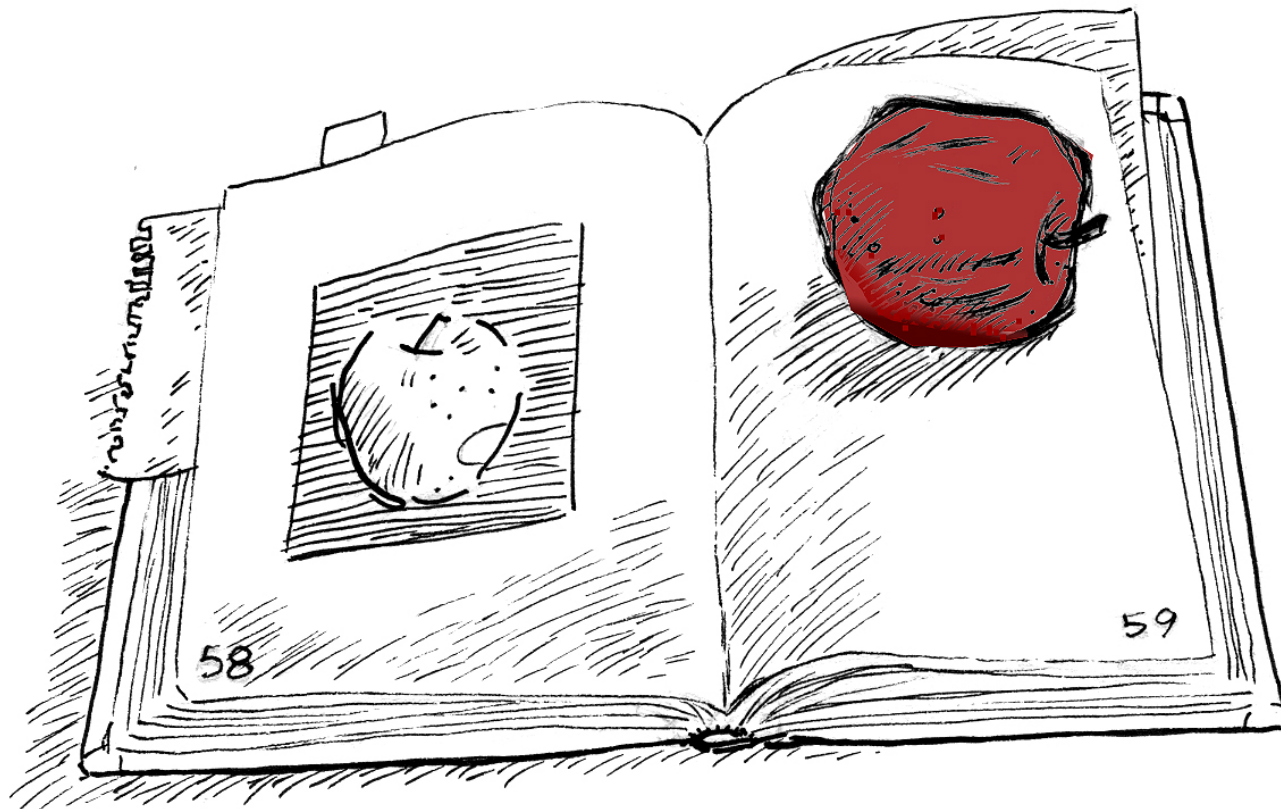

# What is a Thesis?

---

## **An English 1301 basic thesis statement is:**

- is the unifying force in the paper
- it is the point you are arguing; the thesis defines your position on a subject;  
your paper will provide convincing evidence to support the thesis
- a declarative statement, composed of one or two sentences

The thesis states a fact about your topic and your point of view on the topic:

**topic** + **opinion** + **fact** = thesis

**The Texas policy of capital punishment** is a working example  
of a system of state-controlled policies **which acts as a deterrent to crime.**

# *What is a Thesis?*

---

- In this fashion the instructor/audience sees:
  - > the student/author has an opinion on the debate,  
but is open for further discussion from both sides of the issue
  - > the narrow topic addresses specific Texas legislation regarding executions
  - > a cause/effect pattern will be utilized
- The paper will only use defense which examines the specific issues and statistics relating to Texas state policies on capital punishment.
- The paper may bring up issues in other states or show statistics nationwide, however, the main emphasis is on Texas policies.

# *Declaring a Thesis*

---

**Typically the thesis is located as the last sentence of an introductory paragraph.**

On occasion, with cautious preparation, a thesis may be positioned in a non-obvious location within the opening sections of the full paper.
