- 6. Is Emily a figure of revenge with tragic circumstances or a "crazy old woman" living in a world of delusion? Back up your ideas with evidence from story.
- 7. Compare Miss Emily with Poe's Montresor and Poe's unnamed protagonist. Which does she mirror the closest? Back up your answer with evidence.
- 8. Compare Miss Emily against the other protagonists in past readings for class: the Goose Girl, Chopin's Mrs. Mallard, and Gilman's unnamed victim.
