Course Catalog Description –

Study of English to improve students' ability to think objectively and to communicate effectively. Stress on clarity and effectiveness in the sentence, paragraph, and whole composition. The composition is chiefly expository and assigned material is designed to increase students' ability to read objectively, to develop skills in critical analysis, and to improve style. Prerequisites: THEA reading and writing requirements met. [Offered Fall, Spring, and Summer semesters. Also offered as an Internet course.]

Classroom Etiquette:

ASSIGNMENTS

Students will write a minimum of four full essays, some of which will be started in class. Likewise, students will compose an eight-page research paper as a final project.

- These four essays will be turned in as print files and as digital files.
- There will be in-class assignments and occasional homework. We will have several reading quizzes as well. Since these are based on specific lectures, you must be present on the day the inclass assignment is given and collected.
- No late work will be accepted for in-class work, reading quizzes, or for missed homework.

LATE PAPER POLICY

Since the progress of this class depends on essays turned in on time, late essays will be penalized ten points for each course day that they are late. If you miss class when an essay is due, valid documentation is required explaining the absence for the paper to be considered on time.

- After a three (3) class days late papers will not be accepted.
- Printed work is collected within the first few moments of class.
- Papers turned in *after* class, *even just a few minutes*, is considered late. *Staple papers before class begins. Do not dog-ear papers.*

MISSED EXAMS POLICY

Depending on circumstances, missed examinations must be taken within a week of scheduled test.

GRADING STANDARDS

Essays will be graded based on a variety of skills. All written work should show evidence of logical thought and strong concepts. Points will be deducted for errors on your essays.

Serious Grammatical Error: (lower grade point for each / 3 or more, revise)

- i. fused sentences
- ii. sentence fragments
- iii. comma splices, run-on sentences

Serious Grammatical Flaw: (point by point for each occurrence)

- i. subject-verb agreement and tense inconsistency
- ii. pronoun antecedent agreement
- iii. indefinite pronoun reference
- iv. dangling or misplaced modifier
- v. non-parallelism

Improper Essay Format (point by point for each occurrence)

- i. lack of introduction or weak introduction
- ii. less than 5 sentences per paragraph
- iii. lack of topic sentence or weak topic sentence
- iv. lack of unity within individual paragraphs
- v. lack of logical sequence between paragraphs
- vi. lack of conclusion or weak conclusion

Improper spelling (5 or more misspelled words, failed assignment)

• The school has tutors available for you at the *Learning Assistance Center*. I recommend you visit them with early drafts of your papers before turning in work.

ESSAY FORMAT

Essays should be typed double-spaced and have a standard one-inch margin. Always use Times New Roman, 12 point size. No title page is necessary. For all essays, follow the template provided. Put your last name and the page number in the upper right hand corner of each page using the "header" feature in Word 2003, Word 2007.

- When making corrections, be neat and use ink.
- Staple your essay before coming to class. I will not accept work not stapled.
- Your grade will be lowered a full letter-point if your paper does not follow MLA standards. This includes proper heading, titling, paragraph formatting, and margins.
