
The Works Cited Page



Basic information for Works Cited entries begins in the *Bedford* on page 530 with a directory of options.

- Although most database entries are supplied with an automatic citation, these can be incorrectly generated. You need to double check to be sure you are provided accurate information.
- Likewise, do not rely on Microsoft Word to automatically generate a correct works cited entry. The system is not compliant with the MLA standards.

Page 588 has a working example of a works cited for a basic research paper.

Page 620 shows a working example of a literary analysis paper.

1. Basic Print Entry: Author's name. Title of Book. Publication info.:

New York: Vintage Books, 1978. Print.

2. Basic Web Page Article, with Author:

However, remember that the final project requires articles from a database and not from a commercial web site, such as this example.

3. Basic Web Page Article, with Two Authors:

Byrd, Katy and Nathan Harrod. "Shakespeare's Sonnets." Springfield HS.

URLs are no longer required for Works Cited pages. Your instructor may ask for you to show them however.

4. Basic Web Page Entry, without Authors:

"Sister Aimee." *American Experience*. PBS Online, 2 Apr. 2007. Web. 30 October 2008.

This entry therefore would be located in the 'S' section of the page.

5. Basic Article from Online Scholarly Journal, with Author:

6. Basic Article from Database, with Author's name:

Remember database titles are shown in italics, in this case JSTOR.
