Form:

(Appearance, Style, Format)

- What type of story is it: Gothic, Existensial, Fantasy, etc.?
- What figurative language is used? (metaphor, simile, personification, etc.)
 - What images are used in the work?
 - Any obvious allusions or symbols used in the work?
 - What is the main theme of the piece?
 - What is the overall mood of the piece?
 - What language style is expressed, formal or colloquial?

Topic/Story

Relevance:

(Significance, Substance, Connection)

- How does the work relate to your own life?
- Does it remind you of a past event or situation?
- Describe other similar works or comparable styles common with the individual story.
- How does the work relate to the poet's life?
- Study the time period in which the piece was written.
- How much influence can be shown from an outside cultural event?

Questions: (Interpretation, Connotation, Denotation)

—to ask yourself:

Do I understand the piece? What is the theme?

• Be able to summarize the plot.

—to ask the author:

What was the writer's intention?

• Be able to identify any social issue shown in the work.

—to ask academia/the class:

Why this piece is included in the literary canon?

• Be able to defend your opinion.

Content:

(Meaning, Inference, Suggestive)

Is the author attempting to express social issues? Is the expression of the social issues successful? Are there any connections to current events today?
